February and March 2019 Worship

The narrative lectionary respects the traditional Christian church year, with its principal seasons --Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, and Pentecost. It also respects the rhythms of the school year. We will spend January-April immersed in the gospel of Matthew. These same texts will be used in Preschool, Elementary, and Middle School Sunday School classes.

February 3

"The Lord's Prayer" Matthew 6:7-21 [25-34] Jesus continues the Sermon on the Mount by encouraging prayer that puts us in relationship with God, and offers a form that can be used as a starting place for such prayer.

February 10

"Built on the Rock" Matthew 7:1-14, 24-29 The conclusion of the Sermon on the Mount offers further insights on the life of discipleship, and the promise that this life will offer us the firm foundation we need to live in the kingdom of God.

February 17

"Like a Mustard Seed" Matthew 13:24-43 Jesus tells a series of parables that surprise and challenge our concept of God's kingdom.

February 24

"Feeding of the 5000" Matthew 14:13-33 By feeding a multitude and walking across a stormy sea, Jesus demonstrates that God is at work taking care of God's people. "The Transfiguration" Matthew 16:24–17:8 Jesus is transfigured before his key disciples. His identity and mission are reaffirmed by the voice of God from above.

"The Unforgiving Servant" Matthew 18:15-35 Jesus instructs his followers on how to resolve disputes among them with a call to forgiveness. He tells the Parable of the Unforgiving Servant about a servant who fails to show the same grace to his debtors as was shown to him.

March 17

"The Laborers in the Vineyard" Matthew 20:1-6 Jesus tells the parable where a landowner hires laborers throughout the day. Those who hired last were paid the same as those who were first.

March 24

"The Wedding Banquet" Matthew 22:1-14 Jesus tells the parable about a king wanting to give a wedding banquet, but the guests do not come. The king sends people out to find guests so that the wedding hall would be filled.



Education Hour Classes

Children's Sunday School

All children <u>preK-4th</u> have Sunday School upstairs. The children will continue to explore the scriptures of the Narrative Lectionary. <u>All PreK-4th grade children will be walked to the steps of the Sanctuary following the education hour and can be picked up there by a parent/grandparent.</u>

Youth Sunday School

Beginning in January, our <u>5th graders</u> will join the Middle School Class to become the <u>5th-7th</u> <u>Grade Class.</u> This class will follow the narrative lectionary and explore scripture after they have heard it during the summer. The <u>8th-12th Grade Class</u>- will engage in participant led questions and conversations. Join us upstairs for fantastic discussions!

Adult Sunday School

The Fireside Class- We are a group of mixed ages, both single and married, with and without children. Teaching responsibilities are shared between our two leaders, and occasionally class members, and a mix of lecture and discussion. We meet on Sunday mornings in Clarke's Kitchen beside the fireplace. Disciple Class- Do you feel troubled or anxious about the world or your family's life these days? The Disciple Class is studying *Unafraid: Liiving with Courage and Hope in Uncertain Times* by Adam Hamilton. The series explores worries we all experience and helps us discover practical steps for overcoming them, in the light of Scripture. The group meets in the room at the back of the sanctuary during Education Hour. Topics include:

- 4. Apocalypse, Change, Missing Out, and Finances
- 5. Aging, Illness, Dying, and Fear of the Lord

Outreach

Calling All Hands. Please join us for our 4th Annual Rise Against Hunger Food Packing Session on Saturday morning, March 30th. Our goal is to pack 15,000 meals for distribution around the world to support Hunger Alleviation Efforts. However, in order to accomplish this Mission, we need the congregation's help. First, we must raise an additional \$500 through our 2 Cents a Meal Collection to cover the cost of the meals and second, we need members willing to give three or four hours of their time that Saturday. Remember what Jesus sad, "I was hungry and you gave Me something to eat".

Café Justo is a collective of families that grow their coffee and sell it directly to the consumer. Café Justo coffee is Fair Trade and organic; in addition Café Justo keeps the farmers involved in the entire process of making coffee, particularly the roasting of the beans, where the majority of the profit is. Café Justo provides sustainable wages to the coffee growers and therefore prevents those families from poverty and migration from Mexico to the United States.



Café Justo coffee will be available to purchase on the third Sunday of the month. .
